A Family Perspective

Today's gospel is about missionaries. As Jesus received a mission today, parents accept the mission of raising a family. Parents are not alone in this exhausting and difficult mission. Today Jesus tells us “Come to me and I will give you rest.”

Comboni Missionaries of the Heart of Jesus

Saint Daniel Comboni, the first Bishop of Central Africa, founded the Comboni Missionaries of the Heart of Jesus in 1867. Initially they were a fraternity of priests and brothers from across Europe doing mission work in Africa under the name of the Institute for the African Missions. They became a religious congregation in 1895 and were popularly known as the Verona Fathers. In 1979 the name Comboni Missionaries of the Heart of Jesus was adopted to honor both the founder and the spirituality of the society.

The Comboni Missionaries care for the poor and abandoned people in any area of the world, which the Holy See entrusts to them. Their method of evangelizing is directed to the whole person through the preaching of the Gospel and the development of social and educational structures in cooperation with existing resources and in a spirit of service to the local Church. They are very active in the formation of religious and lay leaders in the fields of education, mass media, and, when needed, relief work and refugee assistance, especially in Africa.

Funds Collected during the Missionary Cooperative Plan go mostly into the Small Mission Projects Fund. Comboni Missionaries and others in Africa and Latin America submit people-related projects for funding. At present, many projects are assisting refugees in the Republic of South Sudan, Uganda and Congo. Other projects are dealing with AIDS prevention and the assistance of AIDS orphans. Still other projects train both religious and lay missionaries and support secondary education for women. And, finally, some projects focus on drilling wells for safe drinking water for desert dwellers in Ethiopia, Eritrea and Kenya.

The Comboni Missionaries in North America number 33 and are present in the Archdioceses of Chicago, Cincinnati, Los Angeles, Newark, and the Diocese of Hamilton, Ontario, Canada. They work among minority groups, educate young people for service in foreign missions. .
